

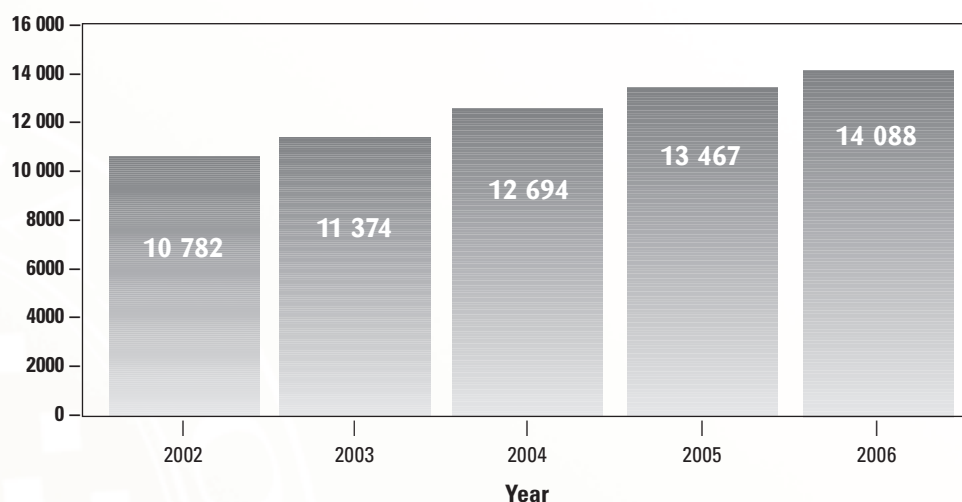


CERTIFICATION STATISTICS FOR 2006

The CNA Certification Program is important to nurses, the nursing profession, employers and the general public. By achieving CNA certification, nurses commit to a national standard of professional competence that demonstrates a comprehensive understanding of their specialty and a commitment to continuing competence. Specialty certification is a voluntary process reserved for nurses who meet rigorous practice, continuous learning and testing requirements.

Currently, registered nurses in Canada can become certified in 17 different specialties through the program, which has grown each year since it began with one specialty in 1991. Over the last five years CNA certification numbers have consistently increased to reach a total of 14,088 valid CNA certifications in 2006.

CERTIFICATION SPECIALTIES

The total number of valid CNA certifications in 2006 in Canada increased by 5% from the previous year. The Critical Care – Pediatric specialty has demonstrated the greatest growth with a 54% increase in 2006. Three new nursing specialties joined the CNA Certification Program in 2006: Community Health, Orthopaedic and Rehabilitation Nursing. The three specialties met expectations with a strong contingent of candidates writing the inaugural administration of their respective CNA Certification exams.

In 2005, Gerontological Nursing became the specialty with the highest number of valid CNA certifications and it maintains this position in 2006 with an impressive 6.1% increase. Perioperative and Psychiatric/Mental Health Nursing follow to round off the top three nursing specialties with the overall highest number of valid CNA certifications. The Cardiovascular specialty does not have the most certifications, but over the last five years has demonstrated more progress than any other specialty. From 2002 to 2006, the number of Cardiovascular certifications has increased by 139%.
